This is a 1988 Japanese anime film written and directed by Hayao Miyazaki. The film follows two young daughters of a professor and their interactions with friendly wood spirits Totoro in postwar rural Japan. The girls befriend Totoro, the spirit of the forest. As the girls' mother lies sick in the hospital, Totoro brings the sisters on a magical adventure but also helps them to understand the realities of life. The film won the Animage Anime Grand Prix prize and the Mainichi Film Award for Best Film in 1988.



Speed Scandal

A conversation about a single teenage mother and her child usually generates hush tones, down-cast eyes, and grim expressions in Korea. That was before Korea's 2008 blockbuster comedy *Speed Scandal*. This brilliant film breaks away from the routine of traditional Korean slapstick comedy. There are no drunken men squealing like pigs on microphones with zany necktie over their heads in a singing room. Meticulous facial expressions and intricate wordplay differentiates *Speed Scandal* as the fresh comedy modern Korean audiences have been craving for. This comedy conveys lessons about the importance of family that are familiar and typically serious in Korea today.
