NEW NAME FOR PCPS

Rev. Joseph Marina, S.J., President of The University of Scranton, has announced that the Board of Trustees has approved the renaming of the Panuska College of Professional Studies to the "Leahy College of Health Sciences," and the renaming of the "Commons" and Faculty/Student Research Program to the "Rev. J.A. Panuska, S.J., Commons" and the "Rev. J. A. Panuska, S.J., Faculty/Student Research Program," in honor of the late, longest-serving President in the University's history.

"Since its founding in the mid-1980s as the College of Health, Education and Human Resources, and later Panuska College of Professional Studies, the College's academic offerings have increasingly coalesced around health science disciplines. The recent movement of the Education Department to the University's College of Arts and Sciences creates the opportunity for greater clarity of purpose," said Father Marina.

STRATEGIC PLANNING UPDATE

We are beginning the process to construct the University's next strategic plan for 2025 and beyond. The University Planning Committee will be steering this process, which will include opportunities for all members of the University committee to share their input. This spring, Kate Yerkes, Assistant Provost for Planning & Institutional Effectiveness and I will be visiting the Student, Staff, and Faculty Senates to share information and gather preliminary ideas and suggestions about topics that should be considered as part of the planning process. Faculty and staff may also contribute ideas via a strategic planning survey, distributed via email, which will remain open through April 19th. Work will continue through the fall semester as drafts of the new plan are prepared, with review and refinement to continue through the spring. Our goal is to present a new strategic plan to the Board of Trustees for approval in May 2025. Questions, comments, and suggestions can be directed to myself, Kate, or to the University Planning Committee through its Faculty Senate representatives.

STATE BOARD OF NURSING

The new Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioner program, Psychiatric Mental Health Doctor of Nursing Practice program and the Post-Master's Certificate program were approved by the State Board of Nursing on March 6, 2024. All programs will be offered fully on-line beginning in Fall term 2025.

Spring 2024 Semester Study Abroad Students

- In the Spring 2024 semester, we have 27 students studying abroad on Spring semester programs and 2 students completing their academic year abroad.
- The students' host university sites include Barcelona (4 students); Madrid (5); Florence (5); Rome (5); Milan (2); London (4); Edinburgh (2); Buenos Aires (1); and Tokyo (1).

Forecast for Summer and Fall 2024 Study Abroad

- 19 students plan to go abroad this Summer on faculty-led courses in May/June.
- About 30 students plan to study abroad at partner universities this Summer.
- About 15 students plan to study abroad for the Fall semester. (Typically, our Fall numbers are smaller than Spring because Spring is more-often recommended for KSOM and PCPS majors due to class schedules.)
- Numbers will be more defined after our Summer and Fall study abroad application deadline of April 15th.

The CTLE website has been divided and redesigned into compatible <u>CTE</u> and <u>OSSS</u> websites. Additional resources have been added to the sites including additional plagiarism and artificial intelligence resources website.

Presentations/Workshops

CTE created two videos,

- "Accommodate Overview" and "Brightspace Basics" for onboarding new adjunct faculty.
- Brian Snapp presented "Making Your Brightspace Course Accessible" to several faculty.
- CTE offered Brightspace workshops: *Basics, Exams, Gradebook, Assignments, Discussion Forums, Rubrics and Turnitin.com.*
- Brian Snapp and Corinne Nulton provided additional plagiarism and artificial intelligence resources for faculty via our CTE website. In addition, they are currently evaluating ZeroGPT, Turnitin, Copyleaks and Sapling for their effectiveness in detecting AI in writing.
- Corinne Nulton offered the "Assessment Strategies for Artificial Intelligence" workshop. Nine faculty attended and discussion was productive.

Updates

- Administration of the course evaluation system has gone well. CTE is in collaboration with IT on some suggested improvements to the daily administration and reporting. These are mostly focused on converting documentation to PDF. These are pending:
 - a. Create filter to query and generate Summary Comparative Analyses (SCA's) by department, giving deans the ability to disseminate SCA's to chairs more efficiently.
 - b. In collaboration with the Provost's Office, create a filter to generate SCA's by individual faculty. These may then be uploaded to secure Sharepoint folders for access by the Provost's Office. This will assist in the rank & tenure process.
 - c. In collaboration with IT, create a query to generate course evaluation data by individual program. This data will be valuable for accreditation or assessment of programs.
 - d. In collaboration with IT, create a course evaluation summary including the comparison groups and comments in one PDF. This will assist faculty preparing electronic dossiers for rank & tenure.
- Our student course evaluation system continues to run smoothly and garners high response rates from students. Spring 2024 is currently a non-mandatory semester for most full-time faculty.
- Additional efforts to combat plagiarism include our license for Turnitin.com. We currently have just over 100 instructors using the Turnitin integration with Brightspace. There has been an increase in total Turnitin paper submissions from 27,000 in the Spring semester 2024 to 36,000 in the Fall of 2024. 10% of the fall paper submissions show a

similarity index of greater than 50%. Disclaimer: this could be due to actual plagiarism or the configuration of the dropbox further.
