BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING UPDATE

The Education Committee of the Board of Trustees met on Thursday, February 22nd and approved the language changes in Section 5.1, 6.0, and Appendix III of the *Faculty Handbook*, that were approved by the Faculty Handbook Committee, the faculty and the FPC. The language clarifies that access to materials uploaded to the University system regarding, evaluations, and tenure and promotion will be granted to the appropriate individuals within one day of the submission deadline.

STRATEGIC PLAN

The University will begin the planning process for our next Strategic Plan this Spring semester. The University Planning Committee will take the lead in planning, and the May Academic Affairs Town Hall will be an initial venue for the faculty to contribute to the planning process.

HEDS SURVEY

Last Spring, the Provost's Council for Diversity and Inclusion administered the HEDS Diversity and Equity Campus Climate Survey. The Survey asked students, faculty, staff, and administrators about their perceptions of the University's climate and how the University supports diversity and equity, as well as their experiences with discrimination and harassment at the University. The Council administered the Survey to obtain a better understanding of the extent to which the campus climate supports diversity and equity, and to inform and improve support, policies, and practices at the University related to diversity and equity, including those to prevent or respond to discrimination and harassment.

A subcommittee of the Council worked on drafting a narrative summarizing the results. We encourage you to review a copy of the most recent <u>2023 Campus Climate for Equity and Diversity at the University of Scranton: Narrative Summary</u>, which includes a link to the data. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion are University priorities and supported by our Catholic, Jesuit Mission and Values.

ENVIRONMENTAL SCAN

I want to thank the academic departments for submitting their proposals for new programs earlier this month. The administration will be reviewing these proposals and will follow up with faculty in the next two weeks.

Our license with Gray expires March 29, 2024. At the Academic Town Hall earlier in February it was suggested by a faculty member that the administration engage in the scanning process independently and then propose academic programs to departments as possible areas of program

development. The administration feels this would not only violate the curricular process, but also be contrary to the spirit of shared governance that has shaped our collaborative work with the Gray tool. The Deans and Provost's Office remain available to academic departments that would like to continue to engage the Gray tool in the next few weeks until our license expires, and we encourage everyone to continue to take advantage of the Gray data.

LAUDATO SI'

I am thrilled to announce that Elizabeth A. Johnson will be joining us on **April 17**th to give a talk entitled: "Jesus and the Earth: Seeing Christ through an Ecological Lens" at **6pm in the Moskovitz Theater**. A summary of her talk is below. Dr. Johnson is distinguished Professor Emerita of Theology at Fordham University in the City of New York, a past president of the Catholic Theological Society of America, an award-winning author, the first woman to receive a doctorate in theology from a Roman Catholic pontifical university, and the recipient of fifteen other honorary doctoral degrees in theology, divinity, and the humane letters.

Summary: At the center of Christian faith is the story of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ, whom people love and follow as their Savior, Emmanuel, God with us. What has this got to do with the Earth, its land, water and air, and the diverse animals and plants that network the planet with ecosystems of life? For the most part, many would say "not much." In our day the ecological emergency raises that question with new vigor. Pursuing it can lead to surprising insights.

FULBRIGHT SCHOLARSHIPS

Two seniors and one alumnus submitted applications for Fulbright Scholarships to spend the 2024-25 academic year overseas. On January 25, we learned that two of the three applicants have been selected as National Semi-Finalists for Fulbright. Unfortunately, the third applicant was not selected to move onto the next round. The two Semi-Finalists' applications have been forwarded to the host countries, where Finalist award decisions will be made in late Spring.

- Shelby Traver, a Political Science, and International Business double major, has been selected as National Semi-Finalist for Fulbright study in Rwanda. Her project proposal is entitled "The Secondary Effects of the Rwanda Gender Quota on the Bureaucracy and Legislative Staff."
- Adrian Laudani, a member of the class of 2018, has been selected as National Semi-Finalist for an English Language Teaching Assistantship in Spain. She has proposed to teach English at the secondary level in either Madrid or Malaga. Adrian received a bachelor's degree in Counseling and Human Services from the University of Scranton, served in the Jesuit Volunteer Corps after graduation, and received a master's degree in International Studies from the University of San Francisco in 2023.

Special thanks are due to the members of our Campus Fulbright Committee for their assistance in interviewing and evaluating the applicants during the Fall semester. The panel included Dr. Michael Alison, Dr. Tata Mbugua, Dr. Jong-Hyun Son, Dr. Habib Zanzana, and Dr. Sinchul Back. We are also grateful to those faculty members who prepared language reports and wrote letters of recommendation on behalf of our students.

Study Abroad

During Intersession 2024, 102 students participated in study abroad.

- 69 students participated in University of Scranton faculty-led study abroad programs. Course destinations were:
 - Galapagos Islands Biology
 - o Brazil Health Administration
 - O Dominican Republic Occupational Therapy
 - o Ireland Nursing
 - o Ireland International Studies.
- 33 students participated in our study abroad partners' programs held in Italy, Ireland, Japan, South Africa, and the United Kingdom.

In the Spring 2024 semester, we have 27 students studying abroad on semester-long programs.

• The students' host university sites include Barcelona (4 students); Madrid (4); Florence (5); Rome (5); Milan (2); London (3); Edinburgh (2); Buenos Aires (1); and Tokyo (1).

International Students

- New Exchange Students: 3 graduate students and 5 undergraduate students from India, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Spain and South Korea.
- We have 1 research scholar from the Philippines and a Short-term Scholar from the Philippines is expected to arrive in March. Both scholars are working with Dr. Gerard Dumancas from our Chemistry Department.
