Marc A. Seid, Ph.D.

Dr. Marc A. Seid, Associate Professor of Biology, Neuroscience Program, focuses his research on behavior of ants. Specifically, how the behavior of individual ants contribute to her colony behavioral dynamics. This research has led Dr. Seid to explore the neuronal mechanisms of how ants make individual decisions, and his research has developed to encompass the neurochemistry and neuroanatomy of the ant brain. He has published several articles on how neurobiology affects the behavior of ants and his lab is currently developing an ant model of opiate addiction. They hope by modeling how individual addicted ants change their colony dynamics, the lab will be able to provide insights on how human addiction influences our society. Dr. Seid is an active member of the Neuroscience program and has helped to establish the University's internship program in Panama with the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute. Since coming to the University, he has revamped the Neuroscience Research Methods course and the Intro Biology Laboratory class and has also developed several other courses (Biology of Social Behavior, Entomology, Neuroethology, and Tropical Ecology).

Dr. Seid has applied for a number of grants to support research in this laboratory, specifically to help provide research opportunities for students. He has an active research laboratory with over 10 undergraduate researchers. Dr. Seid and his students have presented at both international and national meetings, which include the Society of Neuroscience, the International Congress of Entomology, the Neuroethology Congress, He has also coauthored papers with his students. Several of Dr. Seid's past students have gone on to graduate programs in both the USA and aboard, which include, U. of Iowa, U. West Virginia, Drexel, U. Minnesota, Cambridge U., U. of Copenhagen.
