Billie Tadros, Ph.D.

Dr. Billie R. Tadros, an Assistant Professor in the Department of English & Theatre, is a poet and an interdisciplinary scholar with research interests in women's and gender studies, body studies, and writing studies. Dr. Tadros earned her Ph.D. in English with a focus in creative writing from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette in 2017. Prior to this she completed an MFA in writing at Sarah Lawrence College and bachelor's degrees in creative writing and in music at Susquehanna University. She joined the faculty at The University of Scranton in 2018 after teaching as a Lecturer in the Department of English at the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

Dr. Tadros is currently working on a narrative research project exploring the gendered implications of traumatic injuries to self-identified women runners, a project that began as part of her doctoral dissertation. A former distance runner who sustained injuries in a motor vehicle accident, Dr. Tadros interviewed and surveyed 81 other self-identified woman runners who had sustained traumatic injuries. The first publication to develop from her feminist phenomenological analysis of her own injury narrative and the narratives of these other women is a recent book chapter in Women's Health Advocacy: Rhetorical *Ingenuity for the 21st Century* (Routledge, 2020). Dr. Tadros is currently working with a student through the Faculty Student Research Program to finish transcribing and coding the interviews from this project so that she may ultimately develop her findings into a book. Alongside this project, she is working on a manuscript of poems that seeks to articulate a feminist injury poetics. This project follows her third book of poems entitled *Graft Fixation*, forthcoming next year from Gold Wake Press, in which she explores the texts of her injuries in a manuscript that adopts and adapts documents such as surgeon's operative reports and accident reports, and incorporates and repurposes medical language and her own MRI images. This semester her second book Was Body, which she has described as an exploration of queer grief, is out from Indolent Books.

With project director Dr. Ana Ugarte (World Language sand Cultures), Dr. Tadros recently received a Humanities Connections Planning Grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH), and the two professors have been working with a team of faculty representing both the College of Arts and Sciences and the Panuska College of Professional Studies to develop and propose a Health Humanities concentration. Their proposal is currently under review.

Dr. Tadros has recently worked with undergraduate students in honors tutorials and independent studies in creative writing and in the study of illness narratives. In addition to completing her own research, she served as the faculty mentor for three projects sponsored through the Undergraduate Awards for Humanistic Inquiry (UAHI) last academic year, and is currently serving as the faculty mentor for three more projects to receive awards this year. Dr. Tadros is the faculty moderator for the university's chapter of the Sigma Tau Delta international honor society, and in March she will be accompanying seven students who are presenting at the annual convention in Las Vegas.
